Marketplaces and schools, which had previously relied on plastic packaging, began adopting alternatives such as paper and cloth bags.




The plastic collection drives led to a cleaner environment, especially in areas prone to littering. The recycling of plastic waste also reduced the burden on landfills and helped conserve resources.









SCHEDULE OF ACTIVITIES

*DAY -1

The Cadets reported to KSR, Bengaluru, at 1700hrs in preparation for their departure to New Delhi railway station. After boarding the train at 1920hrs, they set off for New Delhi and enjoyed their dinner at 2030hrs.

*DAY -2

The day was spent traveling by train from KSR, Bengaluru to New Delhi Railway Station. The Cadets had their meals on schedule, with breakfast at 0930hrs, lunch at 1350hrs, and dinner at 2030hrs.
